Thinking about the Poem (Page 15)

Question 1.

Question 3.

This rhyme scheme helps in bringing out the contrasting ideas of 'fire' and 'ice' presented in the poem. The poet mentions that both fire and ice are probable ends of this world. Frost also mentions ice in between to symbolise that the coldness and indifference towards one another will be enough to end the world.
